Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic Opens 51st Season with Guest Conductor Erin Freeman

Alexandria, VA—Guest conductor Erin Freeman conducts the Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic in its opening concert of the 2022/2023 Season on **October 16, 2022 at 3 pm at the George Washington Masonic Memorial Theater**. Erin is one of four Music Director Finalists in Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic's **current Music Director search**. Freeman is Artistic Director of The City Choir of Washington, Artistic Director of Wintergreen Music, and Resident Conductor of the Richmond Ballet.

"I'm looking forward to making music with the Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic in October, says **Guest Conductor Erin Freeman**. Inspired by the root of the word "Philharmonic" ("for love of harmony", or music), **this program is ultimately about the power of Love**. In Joel Thompson's powerful *An Act of Resistance*, the concept of love is introduced as a radical solution to the divisiveness that pervades our culture. According to legend, Brahms wrote his double concerto for violin and cello as an act of contrition and reconciliation for his beloved friend Joseph Joachim. (Apparently it worked!) And, audiences will see first hand the brilliance of sibling affection with our featured soloists and brother/sister duo, Meredith and Britton Riley. Finally, the world premiere of *Moviola* for Orchestra by Daron Hagen is centered around the concept of love. From a theme and variations tribute to the cinematic kiss to Hagen's clear reverence for the legacy of Charlie Chaplin and Orson Welles, this work gets to the core of love as an emotion based in admiration, respect, joy, and even humor."

Featured soloists and brother/sister duo violinist Meredith Riley and cellist Britton Riley perform Brahms Double Concerto in A minor, Op. 102. Both Meredith and Britton perform with the National Symphony Orchestra. Meredith tours with the Sphinx Virtuosi and has worked with the Sphinx Organization, dedicated to the development of young Black and Latino classical musicians, for over 15 years. Britton joined the NSO in 2019 after serving as assistant principal cellist of the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra.

Black American Composer and winner of the 2017 Hermitage Prize Joel Thompson wrote *An Act of Resistance* to help "rebuild the strength necessary to love deeply" given the "ubiquitous divisiveness and turmoil in the world" in recent years. The piece is a "battle between selfishness and empathy - pride v. love - and because one is easier than the other, the victor is clear towards the end" when musicians are asked to put down their instruments and stand up and sing. "The act requires a certain vulnerability.... But such is the love that is required to truly change our current circumstance."

Freeman leads the Washington Metropolitan Philharmonic in the world premiere of a piece dedicated to her. American composer Daron Hagen's *Moviola* is a 26-minute tone poem in three movements for large orchestra inspired by evenings Hagen spent as an adolescent in the Oriental Landmark Theater in Milwaukee. "Every day a different double bill (old, and new; arty, and dirty; sacred, and profane) was screened. I grew to adore not just the films but the ritual of going to the movies itself, not to mention the often lavish, always evocative, musical scores for them."
